City Council Updates Water Billing Ordinance

At the February 10, 2025, meeting, City Council approved updates to the Water Billing Ordinance (Chapter 53, Article II, Section 53-38) to help keep things consistent and transparent for residents regarding utility billing.


A key change is that water connection fees will now be set in the annual city budget, ensuring they stay up to date. If no new rate is specified, the previous year's fees will carry over.

Water meters will continue to be read monthly, and bills will still be due by the 20th of each month. If a bill isn't paid by the 25th, a late penalty will apply. Any unpaid balances after the 28th could lead to service disconnection, so it's important to stay current to avoid disruptions.



These updates are designed to streamline billing, maintain financial accountability, and keep city services running smoothly. If you have any questions, feel free to reach out to City Hall!

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Community Updates & Milestones

The City of Liberty Council recently addressed several important items. Resolution 2025-01(R) was adopted, updating the City's Procurement Policy. Two proclamations were issued—one recognizing Arts Advocacy Week, which will be observed February 10–14, and another declaring April as Child Abuse Prevention Month.

The Council held the second reading of Ordinance 2025-01(O), which includes amendments to Chapter 53, Article II, Section 53-38 regarding water billing. Discussions also began for the development of the Capital Improvement Plan. Additionally, a Budget Retreat was scheduled to begin planning for the 2025–2026 City Operating Budget. Ordinance 2025-02 was introduced to amend the Business License Ordinance and update the class schedule as required by Act 176 of 2020.

Third Quarter Budget Update

Profit & Loss by Fund - Q3 2024/2025

General Fund Net Income (Loss) for Q3 2024/2025 is (\$57,939).

Utility Fund Net Income (Loss) for Q3 2024/2025 is \$134,910.

Hospitality Fund Net Income (Loss) for Q3 2024/2025 is \$15,752.

Victim's Services Net Income (Loss) for Q3 2024/2025 is (\$1,808).

Other Funds Net Income (Loss) showing \$188.

Bank Balance at March 2025 is \$2,433,357.54.

The City had an overall net income(loss) of \$91,102 for Q3 2024/2025.

The City is 9 months into the 2025 fiscal year - a good basis to guide progress is comparing budget to actual results. 25% of budget remaining would be the goal. For budgeted revenue, total budgeted revenue remaining is at 32.94% - 8% behind budget. General fund is behind budget at 42.9% remaining while Utility fund is slightly ahead of budget at 18.96%. Hospitality tax revenue is in line with budget at 24.31% remaining.

For expenditures, total expenditures are on track with 28.05% of budget remaining, on target for the 25% goal. General fund is at 25.52% of budget remaining, right at the 25% goal. Utility fund is at 29.82% of budget remaining, ahead of target of 25%. Continue to monitor expenditures and keep spending down as much as possible as this will help to keep spending in line with budget. Overall, revenues and expenditures remaining in line with budget 9 months into FY 2025.

Utility fund, with a year to date net income of , is showing strong thru the first 9 months.

City of Liberty, like many municipalities, are subject to a cyclical revenue cycle throughout their fiscal year. During the year there are months where revenues are minimal and not able to cover expenses incurred in that particular month. This is often offset by months of windfalls from property tax, annual licenses, and other periodic services that create a large surplus of income to help offset the less active months. We are entering the time of the year where large payments for property taxes are received by the city. Tax Programs from MASC are also typically received in a large lump sum in June. Franchise fees are often received once a quarter.

Through the first 9 months of FY25 we are behind the anticipated revenue budget by \$400K which should be reduced from the MASC insurance tax program received in June. The balance moving forward will need to be responsibly distributed to cover the deficits in the final few months of the fiscal year.



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
